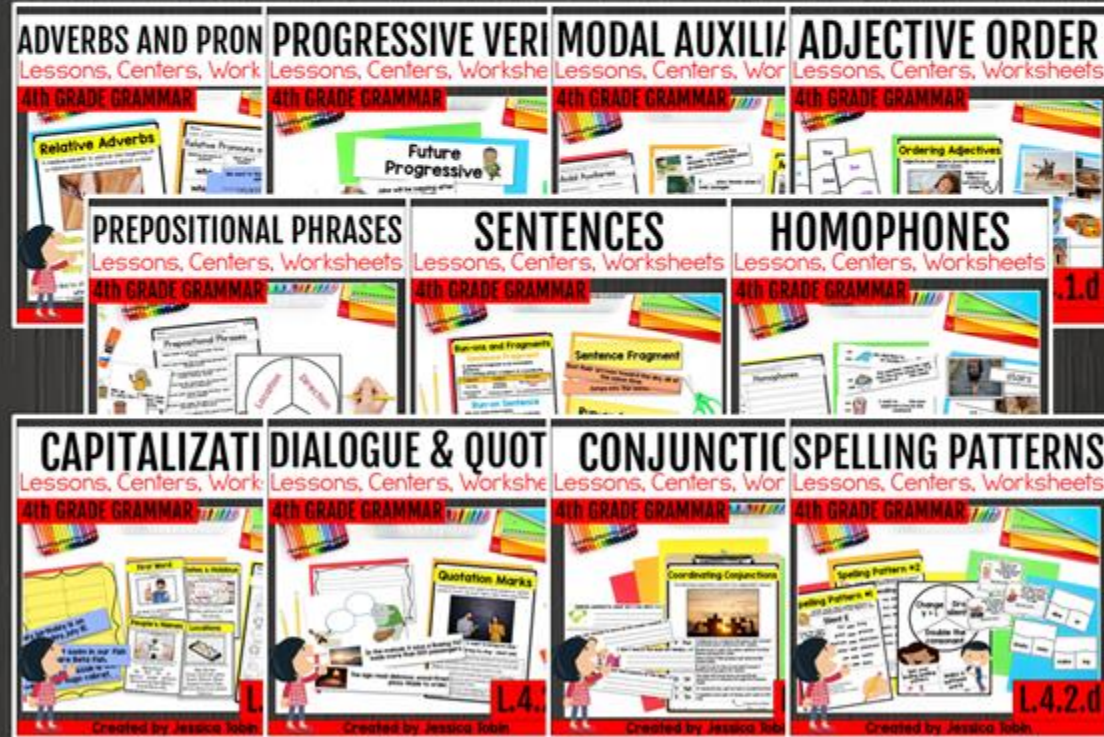

Run-ons and Fragments
Sentence Fragment
• A sentence fragment is an incomplete sentence.
• It is missing either a subject or a predicate.

Fragment	Problem	Correction
The dog.	missing a predicate	The dog chased the rabbit.
watched the movie.	missing a subject	We watched the movie.

Run-on Sentence
• Has too much information.
• May have an extra subject or predicate.
• May contain an extra clause without correct punctuation or conjunction.

Run-on	Problem
Ron wanted to go to the park he had to finish his homework.	
Neville thought today was the best	

Subject and Predicate
A complete sentence has a subject and a predicate.
Subject: the "who" or "what" the sentence subject will always be a person, place, thing, or idea).
Examples: Mary, the boy, Yellowstone National Park.
Predicate

A sentence is a complete thought. Complete sentences follow the "High Five" rules.

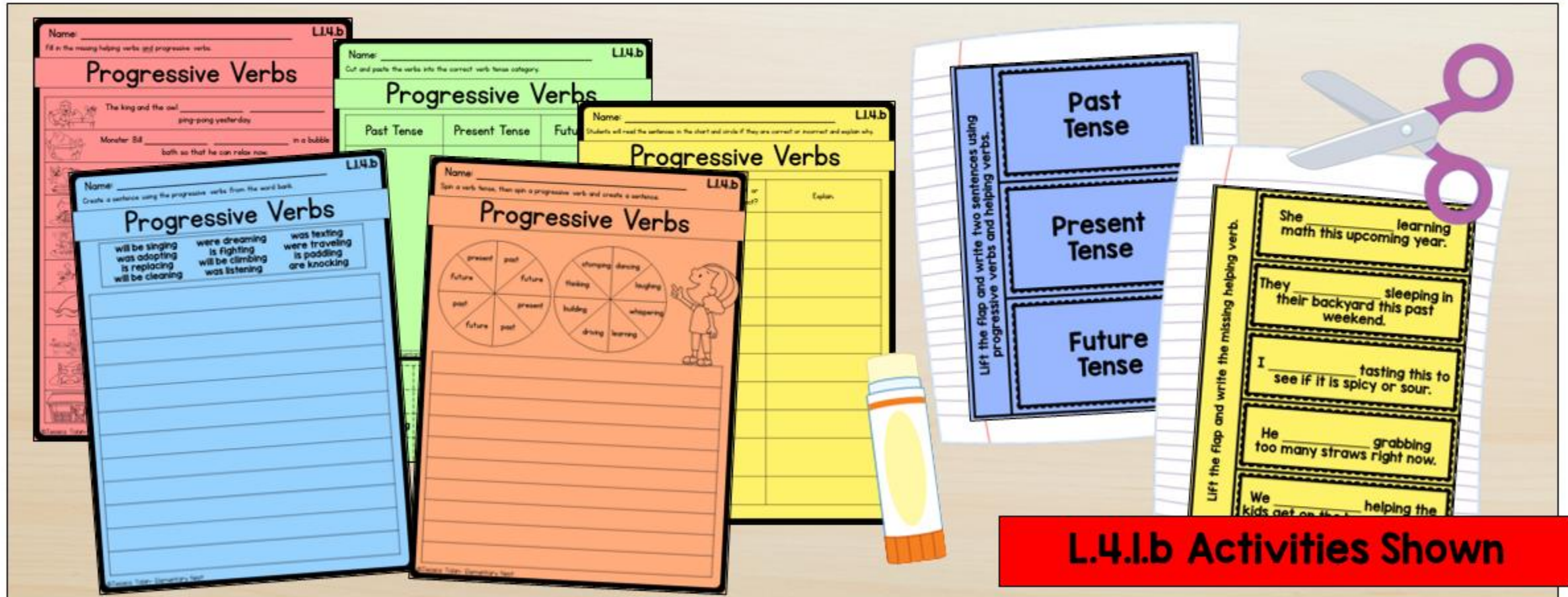
